Re: Indian Country Support for Indian Economic Development & Business Incubators

Dear Chairman Hoeven and Vice Chairman Udall:

We the undersigned organizations, representing the interests of American Indian and Alaska Native tribal governments and business enterprises throughout the United States, write to urge prompt action on two bills that your Committee advanced last year through the Senate, and nearly through the House, to promote entrepreneurship, job creation, business incubation, and economic development of tribal economies. We are delighted that one of these bills, the Indian Community Economic Enhancement Act, has just been introduced as S. 212, and that the other, the Native American Business Incubators Program Act, will be introduced shortly.

We applaud your efforts, and urge other Senators to join in co-sponsoring these key bills designed to make several long-sought federal programmatic changes to promote tribal economic development, most notably by: (1) elevating the Office of Native American Business Development to report directly to the Secretary of Commerce; (2) expanding the Buy Indian Act; (3) reauthorizing and expanding economic development initiatives supported by the Native American Programs Act; (4) directing agencies to work together to promote private investment in Indian Country and update securities regulations so tribes can qualify as accredited investors that could access the \$1 trillion market for debt and equity securities; and (5) establishing a Native American Business Incubators Program to support job growth and tribal economic development by promoting entrepreneurship in tribal communities through business incubators with workspace and related resources to meet the unique needs of Native entrepreneurs starting and growing businesses in Indian Country.

These long-sought initiatives enjoy broad support in Indian Country. Our organizations have endorsed these bills in resolutions, joint letters, and testimony for at least two Senate hearings and two House hearings held on this legislation. Given the previous hearings and markup actions already taken, we ask that you schedule early markup of these two bills so they can move forward quickly for Senate and House approval. Prompt enactment of this legislation would facilitate greater access to capital, create economic development opportunities, enhance procurement and other business assistance for tribal and other Native enterprises throughout the United States, and encourage greater indigenous trade through collaborative initiatives of the Departments of Commerce and Interior, among others.



Thank you for your prompt attention and for working collaboratively with our organizations to advance business and economic development in Indian Country.
